Summer Assignment Description	Students will read <u>Crime and Punishment</u> by Fyodor Dostoyevsky which is one of the most frequently featured works on the Advanced Placement exam. Students will answer study guide questions to guide their reading and thinking.

Tennessee Academic Standards/Approved Standards Supporting Reference (List standard(s) correlation to summer work)	The AP English Literature and Composition course focuses on reading, analyzing, and writing about imaginative literature (fiction, poetry, drama) from various periods. Students engage in close reading and critical analysis of imaginative literature to deepen their understanding of the ways writers use language to provide both meaning and pleasure. As they read, students consider a work's structure, style, and themes, as well as its use of figurative language, imagery, and symbolism. Writing assignments include expository, analytical and argumentative essays that require students to meet the standards from the first Long Fiction or Drama unit.

Rationale for Summer Assignment	3.E Explain the function of a significant event or related set of significant events in a plot. 3.F Explain the function of conflict in a text. The Advanced Placement Literature and Composition exam covers three areas: long fiction, short fiction, and poetry. For long fiction, students are given a topic, such as exile and are asked to choose a long work and use it to write about the topic. This novel is very versatile and provides students with the material they need to address the long fiction portions of the exam.		
Resources needed to complete Summer assignment	Students will need a copy of the novel and the study guide questions.

~Advanced Placement Program Course Description

I know the summer assignment seems lengthy, but the investment will pay off repeatedly throughout the school year and on the AP exam. We will spend the first three weeks of the first quarter completing assignments in class individually and in groups about the novel. You WILL have a test over *Crime and Punishment*, a multiple-choice test. Reading Spark Notes or watching movies will not begin to adequately prepare you for the assessments you will face in my class nor on the AP exam. I also understand that the reading questions may seem to be a burden. However, the reading questions are to help facilitate the **close reading** referred to in the AP course description above. You have more than 8 weeks to complete the reading assignment.

I guarantee that you will not face another work of the length of *Crime and Punishment* for the remainder of the year. In fact, most of the works will be not much longer than 100 pages each since you will have so many assignments from other classes to manage while taking this class.

Summer Reading Title:

1. *Crime and Punishment* by Fyodor Dostoevsky (I recommend the Barnes and Noble edition)

Answer the study guide questions as you read to save time and to fully understand the novel. Don't wait until the last minute to start reading, you should be reading the first week of June. Crime and

Punishment is a long book. It should take you about 13 hours to read the entire book.

Your summer work is due the first Friday of school. I am very excited about this year and working with you. Expect the year to be challenging but rewarding and worthwhile.

Crime and Punishment Assignment



I am providing you with a list of the characters in the book You should hightlight the names the first time you find them in the book. As you read, I want you to highlight the word yellow every time you find it and make a list of page numbers for it inside the cover of your book. Be sure to notice if it is describing people or things. Also, I want you to look for the following symbols, highlight them and note page numbers inside the cover of your book:

- 1. crosses
- 2. ale and taverns
- 3. axe
- 4. blood
- 5. small rooms
- 6. water

You will need to complete 3 assignments for this novel:

- 1. Highlight and make notes in the text as directed above.
- 2. Fill out the dream chart.
- 3. Answer the study questions.

Meet the Characters

Russian middle names, called "patronymics," are derived from the father's first name, with a suffix that indicates the gender of the child. Russian speakers use the first name and

patronymic together – for example, Rodion Romanovich – when they want to refer to someone in a formal way. Family members and close friends use diminutives, shortened versions of the first name – for example, Rodia – to refer to one another affectionately. In this list, diminutives and nicknames appear in parentheses after the full names.

- 7. What is the important feature of Raskolnikov's musings to himself after he leaves his mother and sister?
- 8. The Epilogue has been called the poorest part of Crime and Punishment. What justification can be found for this argument?
- 9. Why is the Epilogue necessary?

Dreams in Crime and Punishment

Some of the characters have multiple dreams in this novel. Dostoevsky uses these literary dreams as a reflection of the past as a prediction of future events. The images (people, places, etc.) can easily be associated with specific events in the character's past.
